When I initially reached out to both coaches, I was surprised to see how receptive, eager, and open they were to be questioned (seemingly interrogated) about this season. The thought of speaking to a coach was a bit intimidating... After all, at some point in life we've all witnessed a coach hollering and screaming as players seem to melt with frustration - and college basketball is no different.

The weight of winning that these coaches carry is no small load, but to my surprise, they seemed to be cool, calm and confident about their coaching style, and their players. I walked away from both interviews feeling optimistic as a fan, and extremely hopeful of a winning basketball season.

Q: Coach Price, how many years have you been coaching at BSC? And what is your experience prior to this position?

A: It's going on 3 years here at BSC. I started in 2016. I started coaching basketball for the youth recreational league, then coached at Bluefield Middle School, and from there to the collegiate level at Bluefield College, and now here at B-State.

Q: What is your philosophy of coaching in relation to education?

A: To me, basketball is tied to education through formulas. Like in practice and games you have to study the formulas in order to win. I have to put it on the board just like a teacher in class. It's really about the study of the game - everybody learns differently - some are visual, while others are audible or hands on learners, but we still have to tie it in to make it the best for the players.

Q: What mentors would you say you've attributed your coaching style to?

A: Coach Richard Morgan at Bluefield College, I was with him 5 years. I'm also a John Calipari, Kentucky Wildcats kind of guy. We watch him a lot. That's tough...so many to name...

Q: When you first began your career at Bluefield State, what was your #1 vision for this program?

A: My #1 one vision/goal was to graduate every senior that was/is on my team. Historically there was a low percentage of seniors graduating. We have several that are graduating now. My vision is to help change that culture and to get a 100% graduation rate.

Q: As far as recruitment, do you focus more on local or outside talent?

A: I pretty much go outside to recruit, but always give the local talent the first look since I'm already here to watch them play. I really look for character players - guys we don't have to worry about academically.


Q: What is your vision for this 2018-2019 season?

A: To win the USCAA tournament. Last year we were able to get in the tournament and this year I want to win it. In order to win, we need to do a better job of rebounding and playing the full 40-minute game.

Q: What would you like to say to the fans and local community about game attendance?

A: Come to a game and get here early. It will be a very exciting and fun game to watch. The community already does a good job of coming out and supporting us.

Ryan Bailey Head Women's Basketball Coach

Q: Coach Bailey, how many years have you been coaching at BSC? And what is your experience prior to this position?

A: I started here March of 2017. I've been coaching since 1999. I started as an assistant and got my first head coach position in 2003.

Q: What is your philosophy of coaching in relation to education?

A: It's all intertwined. To be a college athlete they already know they have to focus on their academics, this gives them more accountability as a student, plus if they're getting scholarships that's an added incentive to focus academically.

Q: What mentors would you say you've attributed your coaching style to?

A: A little old school, like John Wooden (former head coach of UCLA), I worry more about us than the other team. Also, Brad Stevens of the Boston Celtics. His demeanor is so good on game days - calm and collected. And my past coaches, they treated us with such respect and love.

Q: When you first began your career at Bluefield State, what was your #1 vision for this program?

A: To change the culture. To get it back to the days when people were excited about BSC (women's) basketball. To honor past athletes and invite them back.

Q: As far as recruitment, do you focus more on local or outside talent?

A: I recruit both outside and in. We want the best players in the state of WV and have succeeded at doing that. When recruiting outside, I lean on my AAU and junior college contacts to get the best fit for BSC.

Q: What is your vision for this 2018-2019 season?

A: We call it a mission - something we're working towards. I let the players decide and they decided they want to make it to the USCAA national tournament this year. I use that to hold them accountable.

Q: What would you like to say to the fans and local community about game attendance?

A: This is a great group of young ladies. They're not just impressive on the court, but off as well. If you get the chance to know them - you would want to support them in any way.





BSC - CEME Grand Opening

The Center for Excellence in Manufacturing Engineering Has Officially Opened, and is VERY Impressive!



The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) awarded a \$1.5M POWER (Partnerships for Opportunity and Workforce and Economic Revitalization) grant to BSC to establish the Center for Excellence in Manufacturing Engineering (CEME). Pictured above cutting the ribbon are: Dr. Marsha Krotseng, Bluefield State College President (left), Scott Hamilton, ARC Executive Director (center), Jeff McFadden, Assistant Proffessor of Mechanical Engineering Technology, lead author, Executive Director of the project (right).

The core component of CEME is degree and workforce training programs in Manufacturing Engineering Technology (MFGT) and appeals to traditional college students preparing for their first career. CEME also directs special intention to help workers displaced from mining-related jobs to manufacturing. The idea—to utilize the skills (welding, equipment maintanence and installation, knowledge of hydraulics, operating computer controlled equipment, etc.) already possessed by displaced mine workers as transferrable to other areas of manufacturing and industry. MFGT builds on field-specific and state-of-the-art skills so the graduate is highly marketable to emerging industries. Graduates can re-brand themselves for future infusion into existing and new career opportunities.

Because not all transitioning workers need or want a bachelor's degree, CEME also offers certificate programs (seminars/workshops) giving non-degree seeking students mastery over a narrow subject area. Included are general topics like computer programming, quality, solid modeling, robotics, project management, and also works with local manufacturers to design special courses on specific technical topics. CEME will also serve as a Research and Development arm for local industry, with collaborative robotics as major research. Traditionally, industrial robots were isolated from human workers.

BSC Social Science Graduates Receive Pi Gamma Mu International's Prestigious Scholarship Awards



Bluefield State College Social Sciences graduates have received the prestigious Pi Gamma Mu scholarship in each of the past two years. Zachary Green (BSC Class of '17 - pictured left) and Jelena Jevtic (BSC Class of '18 - pictured right) have been awarded the scholarships to continue their studies at the graduate school level.

"This is a noteworthy achievement for Ms. Jevtic, **Mr. Green**, **and** for the Social Sciences program at Bluefield State College," noted Dr. Amanda Matoushek, Chair of the Social Sciences Department and Associate Professor of Psychology. "Only 10 such scholarships are awarded annually, with no more than three scholarships in any one graduate field. This is an incredibly competitive and prestigious scholarship to earn."

The mission statement of Pi Gamma Mu, International Honor Society in Social Sciences, is to "encourage and promote excellence in the social sciences and uphold the ideals of scholarship and service." There are approximately 150 Pi Gamma Mu chapters at institutions of higher education in the United States and overseas.

Green is in his second year of attendance at Elon University School of Law in Greensboro, NC, where he is a Business Law Fellow and staff member for Elon Law Review. As an undergraduate at BSC, Green served as Vice President for Pi Gamma Mu's Bluefield State Chapter during his senior year. He organized open forums at BSC for Mercer County candidates running for the West Virginia State Senate.

"I am incredibly honored to be recognized by Pi Gamma Mu," he observed. "This award is being used to help fund my legal education, which will use to represent and assist small businesses, non-profits, and individuals throughout the Appalachian region. I want to specifically thank Dr. Matoushek, Dr. Montague, and all of the faculty and staff at Bluefield State, without whom this accomplishment would not have been possible. I am grateful for the education and experiences I attained during my undergraduate studies, and will forever consider myself a part of the Bluefield State College community."

Jevtić is Assistant Program Coordinator for NewGen Peacebuilders in Charlotte, NC. While at BSC, she was president of both the College's Student Government Association and the International Student Organization. She graduated as valedictorian (BSC Class of 2018) and was a member of Bluefield State intercollegiate volleyball team. A native of Serbia, she also served as an intern for US Senator Joe Manchin and United Nations Office in Belgrade. She has been selected to attend the 2018 World Youth Forum in Egypt.

"It is such an honor to be selected for this very prestigious scholarship," she said. "Even though I was not able to attend graduate school this year, I am humbled to have received the award and I suggest that all Pi Gamma Mu scholars who have ambitions to attend graduate school apply." 15

BSC Director of Athletics John Lewis Appointed to NCAA Division II Management Council


